Library Continuing Education Program - STIPENDS -

These are stipends for library staff to attend local, regional or national workshops or conferences that relate to their job.

- Apply by short survey at www.Michigan.gov/cestipend.
- Detailed criteria, rules and questions are at the same place.



STIPENDS

Criteria

- Event relates to the staff member's job.
- Applicant is the LIBRARY.
- No Library of Michigan events or internal institutional events

Eligibility

- Current library staff members who remain employed through event.
- Library is a public library, school library or academic library. Special libraries are eligible under some circumstances.
- Haven't received a stipend in the last fiscal year (Oct.-Sept.)



STIPENDS

Timeline

- Apply any time for an event after the next review
- Reviews happen every 3 months
 - End of March, June, September, December

What You Can Get

- In State Event (1 day) - \$300
- In State Event (2 day) - \$600
- In State Event (3 day) - \$900
- Travel Support if event is more than 150 Miles from the library - \$150
- Out of State Event - \$1,600
- Webinar/Class – Actual cost up to \$500



STIPENDS

What Do You Have to Do

- Return Agreement Form
- Attend
- Provide Copy of Article or Presentation You Did After Attending for Your Colleagues
- Provide a Copy of the Event Agenda
 - No later than 30 days after

Level of Effort to Apply and Complete

- Very Easy

Public Library Service Grant Program - SMALL Grants -

These are small grants for public libraries to provide a program over the summer, which provides funds for materials and supplies.

- Apply by application at www.Michigan.gov/lsta.
- Detailed criteria, rules and questions are at the same place.



SMALL Grants

Criteria

- Support for public library programs in the areas of
 - Literacy, Technology, Children & Teens
- AND
- Programs or services to individuals of diverse geographic, cultural, and socioeconomic backgrounds; OR
- Programs or services to individuals with disabilities, and to individuals with limited functional literacy or information skills; OR
- Programs or services expanding services for learning and access to information.

Eligibility

- Michigan public libraries that are lawfully established and currently eligible for state aid.



SMALL Grants

Timeline

- Apply – January/February
- Grant Review – March
- Grant Awards – April
- Grant Activities – May through August
- Reimbursements – End of August
- Report – End of September

What You Can Get

- \$500 to \$2,000 for materials/supplies

Improving Access to Information Grant - MEDIUM Grants -

These are medium grants for public and academic libraries to increase their capacity to provide services in the area of literacy, special collections or to increase community access to the Internet (digital inclusion).

- Apply by application at www.Michigan.gov/lsta.
- Detailed criteria, rules and questions are at the same place.



MEDIUM Grants

Criteria

- Support for public library and academic libraries to build capacity in the areas of
 - Develop or increase the scope of literacy projects in the broad sense; OR
 - Develop or improve access to local history or special collections; OR
 - Improve access to online information and services for users with limited access.

Eligibility

- Michigan public libraries that are lawfully established and currently eligible for state aid and Michigan academic libraries.



MEDIUM Grants

Timeline

- May 31st – Application
- August – Grants awarded
- October through September – Grant work (1 year)
 - Quarterly - Interim reports
 - Quarterly – Reimbursement requests
 - October 31st – Final reports



MEDIUM Grants

What You Can Get

- Grant funds for One Year
- Minimum of \$5,000
- Maximum of \$25,000
- Funds for supplies, staff, consultants, services and travel – ONLY FOR GRANT ACTIVITIES.



MEDIUM Grants

What Do You Have to Do

- Submit Application
- Complete program and evaluations.
- Submit interim and final reports and reimbursement request **WITH** receipts.
 - Must request an extension before the deadline if will be late with any documentation.
 - Must get budget/program changes approved before doing.

Level of Effort to Apply and Complete

- Difficult
 - Basic information, 10 page proposal, detailed budget, partners arranged, signatures for T & C.
 - We will advise if you ask **BEFORE** the application is due.

Collaborative Library Services Grant

- LARGE Grants -

These are large grants for public, school or academic libraries or statewide non-profits dedicated to library services. The grant provides funding for a new service or an extension of a service to the community that is INNOVATIVE and has STRONG partnerships. It funds for supplies, staff, consultants, services and travel.

- Apply by application at www.Michigan.gov/lsta.
- Detailed criteria, rules and questions are at the same place.



LARGE Grants

Criteria

- Support for projects that
 - Provide funding for innovative library services and programs, AND
 - Create the opportunity to develop sustainable new regional or statewide programs, AND
 - Develop partnerships among libraries and/or between libraries and community agencies.
- Projects may
 - Develop an innovative service or program to meet a new community need; OR
 - Meet the increased community demand for a service or resource; AND/OR
 - Improve or develop new services to target populations, such as people from diverse geographic, cultural, and socioeconomic backgrounds; individuals with disabilities; and individuals with limited functional literacy, limited English proficiency or limited information literacy skills.
- Are INNOVATIVE and have STRONG partnerships



LARGE Grants

Eligibility

- Public libraries that are lawfully established and currently eligible for state aid
- School libraries
- Academic libraries
- Research or special libraries under some circumstances
- Statewide non-profits dedicated to library services



LARGE Grants

Timeline

- January 31st – Intent to File
- May 31st – Application
- August – Grants awarded
- October through September – Grant work (1 to 3 years)
 - Quarterly - Interim reports
 - Quarterly – Reimbursement requests
 - October 31st – Final reports



LARGE Grants

What You Can Get

- Grant funds for One, Two, or Three Years
- Minimum of \$50,000 in one year
- Maximum of \$225,000 in one year
- Maximum of \$500,000 over three years
- Funds for supplies, staff, consultants, services and travel – ONLY FOR GRANT ACTIVITIES.



LARGE Grants

What Do You Have to Do

- Submit Application
- Complete program and evaluations.
- Submit interim and final reports and reimbursement request **WITH** receipts.
 - Must request an extension before the deadline if will be late with any documentation.
 - Must get budget/program changes approved before doing.

Level of Effort to Apply and Complete

- Difficult
 - Basic information, 10 page proposal, detailed budget, partners arranged, signatures for T & C.
 - We will advise if you ask **BEFORE** the application is due.

- Very High

Issues with Federal funds

Large Grants

- Libraries can receive grants from one to three years.
- The grant contract year goes over one to three fiscal years.
- If allotment is decreased, fund availability will be decreased even with a grant award.
- We do NOT anticipate this, but want you to know there isn't an encumbered funding source for the grants.



Issues with Federal funds

Large, Medium & Small Grants

- Allowability and allocability of funds
 - Grantees **MUST** spend funds on allowable costs
 - Meaning some costs that are a legitimate need for the program may not be an allowable use for federal funds. Unallowable items or services will not be funded.
 - Grantees **MUST** be able to allocate funds
 - Meaning the cost must be for the grant activity. For example, if only half the supplies go to the grant, only half the cost can be charged to the grant.



Issues with Federal funds

Stipends

- How Do You Get Paid?
 - We pay the stipend to the library.
 - It is up to you and your library if you pay and they reimburse you or they pay.

Large, Medium & Small Grants

- How Do You Get Paid?
 - Reimbursement Only
 - Receipts, not invoices - order forms – packing slips
 - Staff – must track time by the hour and provide documentation
 - Cost listed in the proposal and budget
 - We check both line by line

Documents

- State
 - Publications compiled and disseminated by state (and territorial) government(s) of Michigan
 - Oldest material dates to 1805
 - Records the development, growth and change of state government over time
- Federal
 - Selective (about 33%)
 - Michigan and the Great Lakes region



Some Examples....

- Michigan Manual
- Annual reports of state government departments, agencies and commissions
- Michigan Pioneer and Historical Collection
- Michigan History magazine (till 2009)



Michigan Collection

- Privately and commercially published materials
- Spans history of Michigan and territorial days
- Many types of material: maps, brochures, booklets, plats, etc.
- Provides snapshots of Michigan: people, places, and events over time
- Self-serve and by request through Michigan Rare Book Room



Some Examples....

- Michigan state business gazetteers
- Newspapers
- Periodicals (Michigan Farmer, genealogical society newsletters, etc.)
- Tigers, lumber stamps, county histories, cemetery transcriptions....
- And many more....

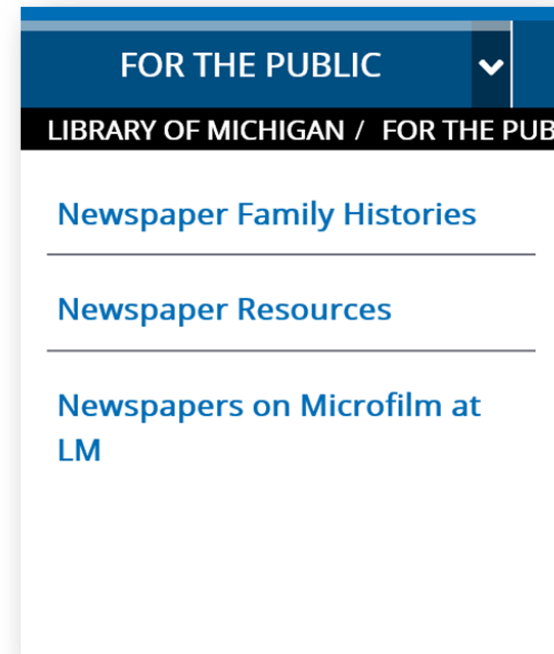


Newspapers
